The Chamber of Commerce met to discuss ongoing changes with this economic downfall

The truth is no longer hidden: the fact that Alberta is in an economic crisis is public knowledge.

Many Albertans are concerned with the drop in oil prices since last June that have continued to decrease. The province is facing an annual revenue short fall due to the energy revenue drop of up to \$7 billion.

The Honourable Robin Campbell, Provincial Finance minister toured the province last week to address stakeholders to let Albertans know what the province's plans are and how they can help.

The Lethbridge Chamber of Commerce

hosted the luncheon and invited Campbell to speak. He addressed many ways the province will deal with the situation.

He mentioned the three main challenges: oil prices, infrastructure and not wanting people to panic."We would not do anything to panic industry," said Campbell.

He affirmed, "There is no place you'd rather be than Alberta." Drawing attention to the 100,000 people moving to the province in the past two years with an expected 70,000 this year.

Oil prices dropping are hard to ignore, however they are not the only revenue income for the province. Campbell is a big supporter of small businesses and says they are actually the province's biggest

employer.

Oil prices will remain low until oil is made more accessible he added. Projects like the Keystone Pipeline and others such as Gateway and Mountain Energy East will continue to be built during these hard economic times. "We can't continue to spend when times are good and cut when they are bad," said Campbell.

He went on to say that investing in small businesses by both the public and the government is important during times like

Priorities in the fiscal plan include healthcare, education and seniors. These were many of the topics discussed during the question and answer period by members of the public.

Campbell once again reminded everyone the provincial government has "to be very prudent in our spending," in order to continue funding in these areas.

Several questions came up regarding education.

The minister shared that he will meet with the minister of education to ensure that spending is kept to a minimum and only important needs.

"We understand the important of education. It's not our intention to cut, but we want to make sure post secondary schools and colleges are spending their money the way it should be spent and that we're getting the best bang for our dollar for our students moving forward," Campbell stated.

Last year's special animal welfare panel that focused on spaying and neutering animals was re-launched last week as a new committee with more support.

Mayor Chris Spearman's launched pilot project, which focused on feral cats, was ended last year due to the terms of references but was quickly brought back to the council.

"Were bringing it back on the table", said councillor Rob Miyashiro.


The Animal Welfare Committee pushes to not only reduce the population of feral cats by spaying and neutering, but to provide monitoring research on rescuing methods for animals.

Monitoring over time, identification for animals and funding for rescue organizations are the new tactics the council is driving towards.

Initiatives for providing support for animals will come from special guidelines that will be implemented by groups and parties to develop and capture the best practices.

Continuing to drive the mass spay and neutering program for animals, the committee will also provide funding for owners who cannot afford the services for their cats and dogs.

Once the committee is fully funded and operational, they will provide items such as pet food and blankets to owners who apply, says Miyashiro, an owner of four rescued animals.





Valentine's Day Couples





All over the world Valentine's Day is celebrated yet expensive for different reasons; however, social concepts have changed. Valentine's Day isn't always for people in relationships. All over the world customs are different.

Valentine's Day is semi-reversed in Japan. In this part of the world it's all about spoiling your man, not the other way around as seen in most western cultures. Most Japanese women are considered shy and not good at expressing their feelings, especially when it comes to love. With this being said, on Valentine's Day the women are supposed to express their love and social obligation. The women don't get left out, don't worry.

The most popular gift for men in Japan is chocolate. On Feb. 14 it's a day for women to rake in the gifts; these gifts mostly consist of lingerie or clothing. "One unspoken rule is that if a women gets chocolate, they have to be twice if not three times the price of what the man received on Valentine's Day," said Saki Rin, an international student (from Japan) at the University of Lethbridge.

The day devoted to women is called White Day. This name was given to the day to represent popularity among popular gifting and purity.

Much like Japan, South Korea has a similar tradition following Valentine's Day. Women in South Korea spoil their men with chocolate as well. They have White Day also where, the women then get showered in return. In addition to White Day and Valentine's Day they have a day called "Black Day." Black Day is on April 14, a month after White Day.

The single people of South Korea have an informal tradition of going to restaurants to eat a dish called 'jajangmyeon.' It's a dish made up of white noodles with black bean sauce. The noodles are then cooked and turn black. The tradition of eating out with another single person is to celebrate being single however, some people look at this tradition as a form of mourning. In South Korea the 14th day of each month is a day devoted to "love".

Valentine's Day has been friend zoned. In Finland and Estonia, Valentine's Day is not for the romantic kind of love. It is considered a day of celebrating friendship rather than romance. The name itself translates to Friends Day. "Popular gifts include cards and gifts among friends. Most people are causal saying Happy Friends Day. Oddly enough this is the most popular day for couples to get

engaged," Adda Axton a local immigrant from Finland explains. She also went on to say how strange our traditions surrounding a holiday of romantic love actually are.

Valentine's Day is a fairly new holiday in Denmark. This was declared a holiday by the Ministry of Foreign affairs as of 1990 the country celebrates Valentine's Day with a Danish twist. Rather than traditional North American gifts such as roses, flowers or chocolate in exchange they give their loves pressed white flowers called snowdrops. Another Danish tradition is to give out "Lovers cards" which are transparent cards where you can see a picture inside the card that shows you your gift in the hands of your other half.

An ancient tradition known as Lupercalia requires South African women to wear their hearts on their sleeves, literally. It is customary for the women to pin their love interests name on their sleeve.

Through this tradition they celebrate Valentine's Day, with festivals added for the families. This includes flowers being bought and tokens of love to be given out. To wear your heart on your sleeve is the highest form of flattery and is by far the cutest tradition I've heard of yet.

BCT Structures/Clean Harbors will also be an exhibitor at the event. "BCT decided



New business risk management program

Lethbridge College Partners with Alberta Cattle Feeders Association

A new partnership has formed between Lethbridge College and the Alberta Cattle Feeders Association to develop a business risk management curriculum in the college's agricultural program.

The new curriculum is part of the Southern Alberta Agribusiness Program which was established from a \$5 million donation from Cor Van Raay last June. The program will run in partnership with the University of Lethbridge and will encompass a number of agricultural management areas with business risk management being one of the first pillars to be developed.

Both organizations identified business

risk management as an area that needed further development for industry.

Alberta Cattle Feeders Association, along with other industry members have been working with Lethbridge College to identify what the learning experiences will be like and developing a curriculum that is aligned with the needs of industry.

Lyndsay Smith of Prime Analytics, specializing in risk management software solutions, says ACFA is happy that the development of the programing is taking off and that industry engagement is a priority for Lethbridge College.

"They're very excited. It was obviously something that they were interested in and something that was identified from their board, so they're excited to be moving forward and excited that the college has

been excellent to work with and willing to engage industry," said Smith.

The programming will be available to students to prepare them with the skill sets that the industry requires, as well as available to industry participants

"Having the cattle feeders and other industry members at the table as we develope curriculum is just so critical for us."

to increase and improve their skills in business risk management.

Stuart Cullum, vice president academic and chief operating officer, says that the partnership is valuable as the college will be able to build a curriculum that can properly prepare students for agricultural careers.

"I think if we were building this curriculum without industry partners we would really risk building it in a way that really isn't aligned with what they need," said Cullum. The Agribusiness program is planned to be ready for the fall of 2015.



All three bands are touring together to Calgary and Edmonton later on this month to help promote the festival across the province. Check out the Electric Eye Music festival at eemusicfest.com

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

hilarious night of stand-up comedy with a tour schedule built around what ski hills they are able to hit during the day.



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

The sport of Mixed Martial Arts has been a benchmark in the community of Lethbridge for over 15 years. MMA is full contact fighting in a ring or cage.

Lethbridge has been a hot spot for the sport in the province and has produced some top athletes that have gone on to win at the highest level. Some fighters include UFC fighter Jordan Young Gun who made his UFC debut in March of 2013 against a stiff competitor veteran Dan Miller.

Mein has since kept a strong presence in the welterweight division. Some of the pioneers of the sport in Lethbridge were the late Wyatt Lewis who was one of the first true MMA athletes and instructors from the city. Canadian Martial arts centre Owner, Lee Mein who is also the father of the young UFC start Jordan Mein.

Trevor Hardy was another dominant figure in the early stages of the sport as well Lee and Hardy were the founders of Roadhouse rumble that is now Rumble in the Cage promotions.

Brad Wall currently owns and runs the Progressive Fighting Academy also became a push for the early MMA world in Lethridge.

MMA sometimes gets a bad rep for violent competition and tough competitors

but the sport is much more than just brawn says PFA owner and two-time Muay Thai Kickboxing Champion Brad Wall. Wall being a long time athlete in sports such as hockey and baseball, he says that's what has kept him in the sport all these years.

Born in Airdrie, Maughan spent much of his childhood growing up in Queen Creek, Arizona, a city of over 30,000 people and located 45 minutes south east of Phoenix. Living in the states allowed Maughan to develop the love of basketball and get the exposure not recognized in Canada at the time.

After graduating from high school, Maughan completed a two-year Raleigh, North Carolina mission with The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

"With that came leadership. I think like I was able to be a leader on my mission, I was able to help people and I think that they always call it your best two years right? And I think those two years definitely changed the course of my life," said Maughan.

That leadership has allowed him to become one of the vocal leaders. Not only do his teammates notice the development of his game, but his coaches as well.

"From the first year, he was a little bit

raw. His footwork wasn't as good, but his leadership was always there. His willingness to learn and his willingness to bring the team to the next level was always there, so I think it's a continuous growth for him right now," said Assistant Coach Danhue Lawrence.

As a second year player, Maughan has been asked to carry the bulk of the offensive load for the Kodiaks and he's delivered.

Maughan is averaging close to 16 points and six rebounds per game. But without his teammates, none of these statistics would be possible.

"For me personally, I think its just that balance. They're a really good group of guys. I don't think I've ever had as much fun as I do with this group. I really love this team," said Maughan.

Off the court, Maughan has been taking classes in General Studies to work towards Medical School and becoming a pediatrician. However, playing professional basketball is always a thought that runs through his mind.

"Well I definitely would not turn down professional, that's something that has always been a dream as a kid to go play professional. And I think that if I can continue improving the way I am and keep on playing to this calibre, I think that's definitely a possibility," said Maughan.

Maughan adds that the Kodiaks have the team to advance past the ACAC Championships and challenge for the national title. Due to a wild card spot held by the ACAC this year, two teams from the province have the ability to play for the national title which is held in mid-March.


